President's Message

Our mission is to promote the education and earned benefits of all retirees of Kern County, advocate the safeguarding and continuation of Kern County retiree pension and health benefits, provide avenues of support and information for Kern County retirees and beneficiaries, ensure proper and necessary representation on the Kern County Board of Retirement, and participate as an integral contributor in our Kern County communities quality of life.

Our June luncheon included an informative program presented by Gordon Isen (661-868-1656) who, among his many duties, heads the real estate fraud unit in the District Attorney's Office. His program titled "DON'T BE A VICTIM!" discussed not being a victim of fraud or a scam.

From an earlier TREND President's Message, under the umbrella of interests concerning adult protective services, a study released by MetLife Mature Market Institute, the National Committee for Prevention of Elder Abuse and Virginia Tech University stated that nationwide individuals over 60 years lost at least \$2.9 billion in 2010 to financial exploitation - ranging from simple home repair scams to complex insurance swindles. This figure was up 12% from 2008. So be very careful and make sure you trust those you deal with in any financial matter. Unfortunately and sadly, many of these crimes are committed by family and friends as well as strangers.

Our annual membership Health Fair will be held July 8 (10:00A-2:00P) the day of our BBQ luncheon (free to our membership, but you need to call for tickets if you do not have the monthly pension lunch deduction). This year's Health Fair will be a similar format as last year, with various screenings, health advice and advice on drug usage if you provide lists of medications, herbs and dosages taken. The Health Fair has been very successful in past years with many positive responses from our membership. As with last year, retirees will be offered health information and health screenings from Kaiser, San Joaquin Hospital, Liberty Dental Plan, and VSP (vision care) with a special interest on nutrition this year.

Your REOKC Board of Directors recently approved our scholarship recipients for this year. We awarded two \$750 scholarships to selected high school seniors. The REOKC scholarship winners will be announced at our August meeting. The REOKC Board of Directors is looking at upgrading our scholarship program and seeking new avenues in supporting our community.

As I mentioned in the last TREND, every day our retirees and their families unselfishly volunteer their time and effort for community projects and causes. Many retirees and spouses have volunteered their time at the information desk in the Kern County Administrative Building lobby on Truxtun Avenue. We also thank all of our retirees and families who volunteer for many other organizations in our and other communities. For all the time and effort that retirees put forth to service the public as volunteers at the lobby, I think it is a shame that County Administration continues to try and hijack our vested SRBR funds. At least the staff at General Services, and I do mean staff, truly appreciate what we do.

As for SRBR and at this time, the Board of Supervisors attempt to change SRBR with legislation in Sacramento has not been placed in bill form as of yet. We will continue to keep you apprised of this matter.

When you look at my Board of Retirement report in this TREND, you will be able to read most of the letter sent to request the increase of SRBR benefits. The request is to the Board of Retirement to perform its fiduciary duty and apply the unallocated vested SRBR funds to increase retiree and member benefits. This letter was signed by representatives of bargaining units and REOKC to demonstrate the need for action. This matter was referred to the Finance Committee and will be reviewed on June 26 (after this TREND publication). We will keep you apprised of this matter.

Don't forget our BBQ and Health Fair Luncheon will be on July 8 with serving by table number beginning at 11:30 A.M. The general meeting will begin at 12:00 Noon with no agenda, but the health fair will run from 10:00A to 2:00P.

KCERA Retirement Board

“A retirement system board’s duty to the system’s participants and their beneficiaries shall take precedence over any other duty” (Section 17(b) of Article XVI of the California Constitution).

For over 15 years various political attempts have been executed to circumvent the law (supported by many legal opinions) to try and hijack the Supplemental Retiree Benefit Reserve (SRBR) unallocated vested funds. Deliberately delaying the apportionment of unallocated vested funds for increased benefits and complaining about the increasing fund balance, seems to be questionable abuse of the public trust. The following letter clearly defines the duty of the Board of Retirement’s responsibilities to the 17,000 plus KCERA Membership. Now we face a possible third year of weak, political leadership by the Board of Retirement. The following letter was sent to Chairman Michael Turnipseed and Gloria Dominguez, KCERA Executive Director. Even under these circumstances KCERA staff has always been great to work with in retirement matters. The letter was sent by representatives of Kern County Employees bargaining groups and REOKC to the Board of Retirement, copied to the Board of Supervisors, and reads as follows:

Re: *Request to allocate benefits from the vested Supplemental Retirees Benefit Reserve.*

Dear Mr. Turnipseed and Ms. Dominguez,

The intent of this letter is to request the Kern County Employees Retirement Association Board of Trustees (KCERA Board) to perform its fiduciary duty and assign unallocated Supplemental Retiree Benefit Reserve (SRBR) funds. According to years of numerous legal opinions, SRBR funds are vested by law and the Board is mandated by law to allocate those funds solely for the benefit of current and future retirees and beneficiaries. There is no legal or fiduciary reason for the KCERA Board to avoid the assignment of unallocated SRBR funds to the detriment of the membership. With the exception of the 2005 death benefit increase, no action has been taken for more than 10 years.

[Text from June 30, 2012 Actuarial Report intentionally not included in the excerpt of the letter, but the entire letter with signatures is on the REOKC website at reokc.org.]

Furthermore, the **June 30, 2013 Actuarial Study** by Segal stated the following:

- *The funded status of Total SRBR Benefits as measured by the funded ratio increased from 168.4% as of June 30, 2012 to 176.3% as of June 30, 2013.*
- *Under the Board’s 20/20 policy, if the Present Value of the Targeted Funding with Reserves is more than 100% funded, the Board may consider increasing the SRBR approved benefits. As of June 30, 2013, the funded status is over the 100% benchmark, at 175.5%.*

As of March 4, 2014 KCERA membership totals 17,014 with active members 8,637; retirees and beneficiaries approximately 7,218; and deferred and reciprocal members approximately 1,159. The retirement membership alone continues to

grow significantly, especially with the influx of baby boomers entering retirement in recent years.

For the record, we do have retirees in need of an inflation offset and they should not have their benefits postponed because of misinformed political influence. Again from the **Actuarial Study of June 30, 2013**, Retired Tier I General Members by type, population, and payment are as follows: regular retired - 3,975 members with average monthly pay of \$2,547; disabled retired - 519 members with average monthly pay of \$1,690; and beneficiaries - 697 members with average monthly pay of \$1,209. [The pay does not include any SRBR payments where they apply.] Higher risk older members in their 70s, 80s, and 90s continue to face increased living costs with more health care issues, long term care expenses, care of relatives (children and adults), etc. More detailed information is available from the previously mentioned actuarial studies at the KCERA website that shows the actuarial studies in their entirety.

Unlike last year’s questionable actions and failed attempt to change SRBR vested funding by a hand picked KCERA Finance Committee, the KCERA Board is mandated to advocate for the membership (active and retired), conduct business as responsible fiduciaries, and adhere to the State’s Constitution: ***“A retirement system board’s duty to the system’s participants and their beneficiaries shall take precedence over any other duty” (Section 17(b) of Article XVI of the California Constitution).***

SRBR benefits have not been granted since 2005 when the death benefit was increased from \$1,000 to \$3,000. In today’s environment funeral costs may easily reach \$10,000 to \$15,000 when all costs are considered. Along with the death benefit, SRBR Tier 3 for the 80% inflation offset also seems to be an area of need. Other than the death benefit, more than 10 years have passed without attention to increasing the allocation of vested SRBR funds. The SRBR 20/20 Policy requires a responsible reserve for benefits and was written to conform to law while recognizing the Board’s duty to fund future benefits for all members (active and retired) when funds are available, like now. Years of no action for SRBR unallocated funds and attempting to circumvent the vesting of those funds, raises concern about responsible stewardship of vested SRBR funding.

We request that your Board take the responsible action and commission an actuarial study to explore the use of unallocated vested SRBR funds. The actuarial study evaluation and review should at least include the following relevant issues facing our membership:

- increase the death benefits from \$3,000 to \$5,000 as provided by law, and
- increase SRBR Tier 3 benefits from 80% to as much as 90% to offset inflation as intended by law.

The undersigned request this matter be given due consideration knowing the importance of the law authorizing SRBR and your fiduciary duty to KCERA membership. Your prudent attention to this matter will be greatly appreciated.

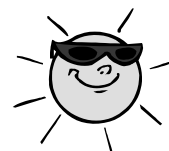

HEALTHY NOTES

DEPRESSION

Depression is common as we age. Up to 70% of all medical complaints have a significant, often hidden emotional component. Physical symptoms associated with depression include headaches, backaches, nausea, and constipation. Some causes are loss of friends through death and children moving too far away to see as often as we'd like. I got depressed when I tried to contact my cousins so I could send Christmas cards last year, having been too busy to send them for two years, and discovered I was the only one left alive in my generation. My mother was the youngest of six sisters, and all her sisters and most of their children had departed for Beulah Land.

That really made me depressed but I cope with that by swimming laps at a local gym and tending to my overgrown garden (though some days that adds to my depression). I eat dark chocolate which has antioxidant properties, and take St. John's Wort which is an antidepressant as God made it, not reformulated so it could be patented but then cause side effects.

I also eat yogurt, and fresh dill (not canned) pickles and sauerkraut. Kefir, a fermented milk product traditional in the Middle East where refrigerators are few and not portable, also has properties which affect the "brain in our gut," a chain of nerves running the length of the large intestine. The Bible talks about the "bowels of compassion" to which that is referring. Even persons who have bipolar (formerly called manic-depressive syndrome) improve when they consume those naturally fermented products. They are far more effective than Big Pharma's expensive drugs which have side effects, often far outweighing their benefits.

My brother, six years younger than I, developed health problems due to lifestyle, and because of a hole in his heart which was not discovered until he threw a clot in his leg when he was in his seventies. The cardiac surgery apparently, as is sometimes the case, released micro clots which affected his ability to think. To calm him down, his doctor prescribed Risperdone, which is linked to stroke, and transient ischemic attack (TIAs) according to a 2003 article in Medscape and should not be used for treatment of dementia but the doctor was unaware of that.

There are many drugs which should not be used in older persons, because they have cumulative anticholinergic properties, and can interfere with our ability to function, making us act older than the calendar says we are. Look that term up on the Internet and you'll find these slow down the excretion of stomach acid, production of saliva, sweat, and bronchial secretions, and increase the heart rate and blood pressure. Adverse effects also include

dry mouth, constipation, difficulty urinating, worsening of glaucoma, blurred vision, and short-term memory problems.

Unfortunately the older we get, the more doctors we go to and the more likely we are to acquire a collection of drugs which are doing more harm than good.

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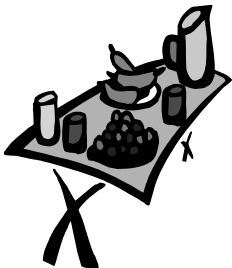
