President's Message Phil Franey

Our mission is to promote the education and earned benefits of all retirees of Kern County, advocate the safeguarding and continuation of Kern County retiree pension and health benefits, provide avenues of support and information for Kern County retirees and beneficiaries, ensure proper and necessary representation on the Kern County Board of Retirement, and participate as an integral contributor in our Kern County communities quality of life.

Never seeming to end are the persistent efforts to change SRBR funding. Your REOKC Board spent much time and money to protect SRBR funding that is solely for the benefit of retirees and beneficiaries (current and future). Fortunately, in late November of 2013 and after almost a year of meetings, the entire KCERA Board unanimously decided (again!) not to change SRBR funding.

We have retirees in need of supplemental benefits to offset inflation and they should not be put off because of politics. I think many retirees will claim they do have a legitimate need when trying to cope with inflation, rising health costs, long term care, supporting family members for health and elder care, etc. Now the Board of Supervisors is pursuing legislation and lobbying for union support to change SRBR funding. On February 11, 2014 the Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution to pursue legislation to change the current SRBR program. Currently the Board of Supervisors has delayed the legislation until they receive union support. As of this writing REOKC representatives continue to meet with the unions and, at times, with the unions and the County in addressing our future SRBR interests. REOKC attorneys, and possibly lobbyist, will continue assisting us in this matter.

The Board of Supervisors is also reviewing employee health insurance plans and will be soliciting health plan offerings in seeking improved plan options with lower employer costs. Eric Barthel, REOKC's health insurance

consultant, is monitoring this process as it relates to retiree health insurance.

Every day our retirees and their families unselfishly volunteer their time and effort for community projects and causes. Many retirees and spouses have volunteered their time at the information desk in the Kern County Administrative Building lobby on Truxtun Avenue. Since 1992 to this past March, the volunteer program has assisted more than 325,000 visitors for over 26,000 hours of public service. In recognition of this effort an annual luncheon is hosted by the Board of Supervisors and General Services for our volunteer retirees and spouses. Later that afternoon, the Board of Supervisors will proclaim Volunteer Host and Hostess Day in Kern County. Congratulations to our retirees and spouses on a job well done and the recognition so well deserved.

For relatives of REOKC members, your REOKC Board of Directors approved a scholarship program several years ago. This year we again offered two \$750 dollar scholarships available to high school seniors. Scholarship program information, including requirements, timelines and application forms, is available on our website at reokc.org. We will report on this year's program results soon.

June elections are coming up. So do your civic duty and vote - regardless of your political affiliation. Always take extreme care in how you review the candidates and decide on initiatives.

We are again planning to conduct the membership health fair during the day (10:00A-2:00P) of our July 8th BBQ luncheon (free to REOKC members and spouses). This year's health fair will be a similar format as last year. We continue planning and will keep you updated as we progress. The health fair was very successful last year with many positive responses from our membership. Steve Pettee of Pacific Group Agencies, Inc. is coordinating an effort to have representatives of various supplemental benefit providers at our monthly luncheons. **The Pacific Group Agencies, Inc. (PGAI) Supplemental Benefits Program is a separate program from that of the County's health insurance benefit program.** The PGAI Supplemental Benefits Program is endorsed by REOKC to offer additional Benefits, such as legal services and other insurances to include: dental, vision, pet and accident/travel. **The Supplemental Benefits Program is administered by the Pacific**

KCERA Retirement Board

“A retirement system board’s duty to the system’s participants and their beneficiaries shall take precedence over any other duty” (Section 17(b) of Article XVI of the California Constitution).

A few years ago I discussed some of the issues currently on the Kern County Employees Retirement Association (KCERA) Board Agenda. As mentioned in that article, the KCERA Board (Board) manages many programs including investments, disabilities, audits, actuarial studies, budgets, information technology, and other responsibilities for now more than \$3.4 billion in funds and 17,000 plus members - retired and active. To accomplish many of these responsibilities, the Board has established specific standing committees - administrative, finance, and investment. The services of special consultants and professionals (accounting, actuarial, investment, legal, etc.) are required for the necessary committee due diligence before, during, and after preparation and submittal of recommendations to the Board for approval and action. Please understand that the Board reviews all matters thoroughly, but the committee system allows for the needed pick and shovel work - due diligence. The retirement administration (executive director and staff) plays an integral role in the support and completion of these duties and responsibilities.

The foundation for the many responsibilities of the Board and administration, other than the California Law (The 1937 Retirement Act), is a comprehensive governance structure. **Governance** enforces how a group agrees to **work together** by establishing chains of responsibility, authority, and communication. The objective of governance is to provide a decision framework so that decisions are made proactively to prevent delays in the operational and implementation processes.

The governance structure of KCERA contains numerous **charters** and **policies** designed to guide the Board and Executive Director in governing and managing KCERA. The governance charters identify the primary responsibilities of the Board, board officers, committees, and Executive Director. The governance policies provide guidance on how the Board is to administer its duties. A list of current charters and policies are as follows: Board Operations, Trustee Communications, Trustee Compliance, Conflict of Interest, Due Diligence, Trustee Education, Board Policy Development Process, Trustee Travel, Executive Director Evaluation, Monitoring and Reporting, and Service Provider Evaluation.

For example, the Due Diligence charter and policy sets

forth a structure and process for meeting with investment managers or manager candidates in reviewing and monitoring such matters as organization overview, operational changes, economic perspective, investment performance, litigation issues, investment strategies, etc. The firm of Cortex has consulted the board for many years in the development of the current governance structure. Cortex also performs an annual review and evaluation of the governance policies.

The Board has a separate policy for investing and uses the services of Wurts & Associates, Inc. in the design and monitoring of the investment policy and related investment matters. I know this is a complex process, but I hope you understand that the Board is mandated with addressing fiduciary duties in a sound and responsible manner.

Good news! John De Mario is the new retiree alternate member on the Retirement Board. Many of you know John when worked for County Auditor-Controller and then retired as the County Assistant Treasurer-Tax Collector. John was also past President of REOKC and past Retirement Board Member with a year as chairman. We are very fortunate to have John with his knowledge and extensive experience in accounting and finance. The Board of Supervisors also filled its last vacant Retirement Board position by appointing Dustin Dodgin. Dustin is an attorney with the firm of Klein DeNatale Goldner.

All members are encouraged to attend Retirement Board Meetings on the second Wednesday of each month.

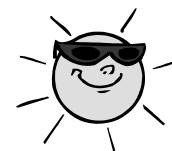

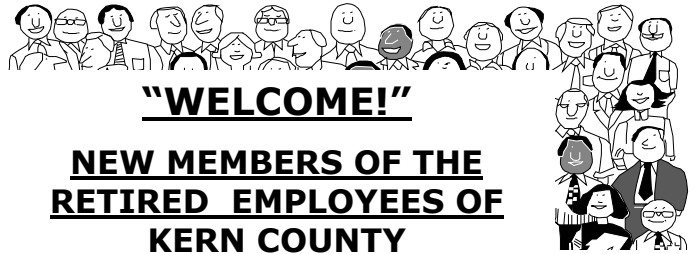

WHY IS REOKC MEMBERSHIP IMPORTANT?

As some of you might have noticed, our new membership list in the last several issues of the TREND is not nearly as long as it once was. What is the reason for the diminishing new members?

Your REOKC Board and KCERA staff members have discussed this problem at great length and procedural changes have been implemented with the hope of increasing our membership. However, we need the help of all our members to encourage retirees, who have not as yet joined our ranks, to do so. These retirees may ask, "How would my \$2.00 a month for dues help?" The following list may assist in answering this question:

1. Dues help pay attorney fees to protect our benefits such as the SRBR funds which pay for several monthly stipends, death benefits, maintaining 80% purchasing power and the additional 0.5% COLA.
2. Dues help pay for keeping our members informed about important issues and possible changes in our benefits through our website, email and our bi-monthly newsletter, the TREND.
3. Dues help REOKC maintain contact with other '37 Act Counties, through conferences, keeping up with problems and litigation throughout California.

KERN COUNTY HISTORY



THE WAY IT WAS

Historians mostly write of events that occurred before they were born and many historians feloniously embroider their writing with suppositions they cannot know or substantiate. I postulate much of my historical writing on what others research; consequently, I cannot vouch for implicit validity. This writing entails a brief first-hand recollection of a time in my life that I experienced; it is a truthful, unembellished account of the way it was. People my age and older who lived in Bakersfield, Kern County and the San Joaquin Valley during the Great Depression can relate to this writing.

The great dust storm called the "Dust Bowl," that blanketed part of central United States during the Great Depression in the 1930s, instigated a mass migration to California. Migrants were called "Okies." They were good, responsible citizens rendered destitute and decimated by the tragedy of the time. The Rosedale-Fruitvale-Greenacres area that is part of metropolitan Bakersfield today was country during the Great Depression.

I remember the pitiful "Okie camp" on Calloway Drive, north of Rosedale Highway. I remember Fruitvale school children my age during the 1930s whose lunches consisted of a cold biscuit brought to school in a well-worn paper sack. Their sacks were folded and put in their pockets for use the next day. I wonder what the children had for breakfast and supper.

John Steinbeck's novel "Grapes of Wrath" included a depiction of migrants who suffered deplorable hardships. I saw John Steinbeck with Kathleen Winsor, authoress of the best-seller "Forever Amber," at a World War II bond rally at KCUHS (Kern County Union High School).

My family was fortunate. My father had a job during the Great Depression; he was a machinist. He earned a dollar to a dollar and a half per day. If no jobs came into the shop, there was no pay for the day. My mother always gave food to any hungry transit that came to our door. My family didn't have much, but we were blessed with what we had.

A small country grocery store was at the south-west corner of Rosedale Highway and Calloway Drive. I don't remember what it was that my mother sent me to the store to buy, but I was in the store when a migrant entered. His wife and rag-tag children were in an old jalopy in front of the store. The auto was laden with their few worldly possessions. The migrant, trying to conceal his pride and humiliation, timidly asked for a loaf of bread for his hungry family. The grocer gave him bread and other food items. The migrant broke down and cried when he thanked the grocer. That still emotionally affects me to this day. It is heartbreaking when people are victims of catastrophes that are no fault of their own.

HEALTHY NOTES

FIGHTING DEATH

Eight years ago my husband died, and during his painful death I learned things about being a nurse and financial manager. I should have suspected cancer, when one morning, after 30 years of eating a bowl of Cheerios with a sliced banana he said, "I'd rather have scrambled eggs this morning." (*A sudden change in appetite is sometimes the first sign of cancer.*)

His was pancreatic, sixth leading cause of death, possibly familial because his father also died from it. My husband's health was worse because like many servicemen he smoked. They told him, "Here's a pack of cigarettes. It'll help you relax while you take a break." A whole generation of men were hooked and now are dying of emphysema, lung cancer, bladder cancer (which he also had), though he'd quit smoking when, as a young father he realized, "This is stupid, burning up money when I need it to support my family."

We made several trips to UCLA to see specialists where my husband was hospitalized a couple of times. (*They have an apartment for patients, or you can tell nearby motels you are a UCLA patient and they'll give you a discount.*) Our local specialist put Bob on twenty different medications trying to find ones which would help, but towards the end we quit all of them and because my Stanford nurses' pharmacology book copyrighted in 1947 said oil of peppermint relaxes the gut, I gave him Peppermint Altoids[®] and put Sea Bands[®] on his wrists to reduce his disease related nausea. (They are sold for combating sea sickness.)

He had a special i.v. inserted in a central blood vessel to provide nourishment. I was so devastated by his death that for about 6 months I ignored the bills for that service, until finally I looked on the internet and learned *in cases of pancreatic cancer, Medicare will pay for it*. So I told the provider, but they had already written it off.

I paid the credit card bills for a few months, then decided I wanted a card in my own name. VISA informed me, "The credit card you were using was in your husband's name. You were only a "user" and you can't use it any more!" That also happened with the department store credit card. (*Wives, who are using your husband's card account, should get one in your own name.*)

There's a saying, "Hindsight is 20-20." Neither of us could accept this was the painful ending of our 52 years

of marriage. When Bob saw an ad in the paper for a new photo printer or a fancy shaving set, and said, "I wonder if I should buy that?" I said, "Of course! That will be your Christmas present," and I went out and bought them. The six cartridge printer sits unused in his office, collecting dust, and the shaving set, I gave to our older son.

When your time of parting comes, remember though memories bring tears, they are precious. The shepherd king David said, "Thou rememberest my tears, Thou savest them in a bottle." I found Hospice provided wonderful support as the group shared tears. Unfortunately adult children sometimes mistake the indecisiveness of grief for dementia, and a widow is shuffled off to a nursing home, there, grieving both the loss of her husband and her home. As I work with families to keep their elders living as independently as possible, I often suggest hospice to work through the tears.

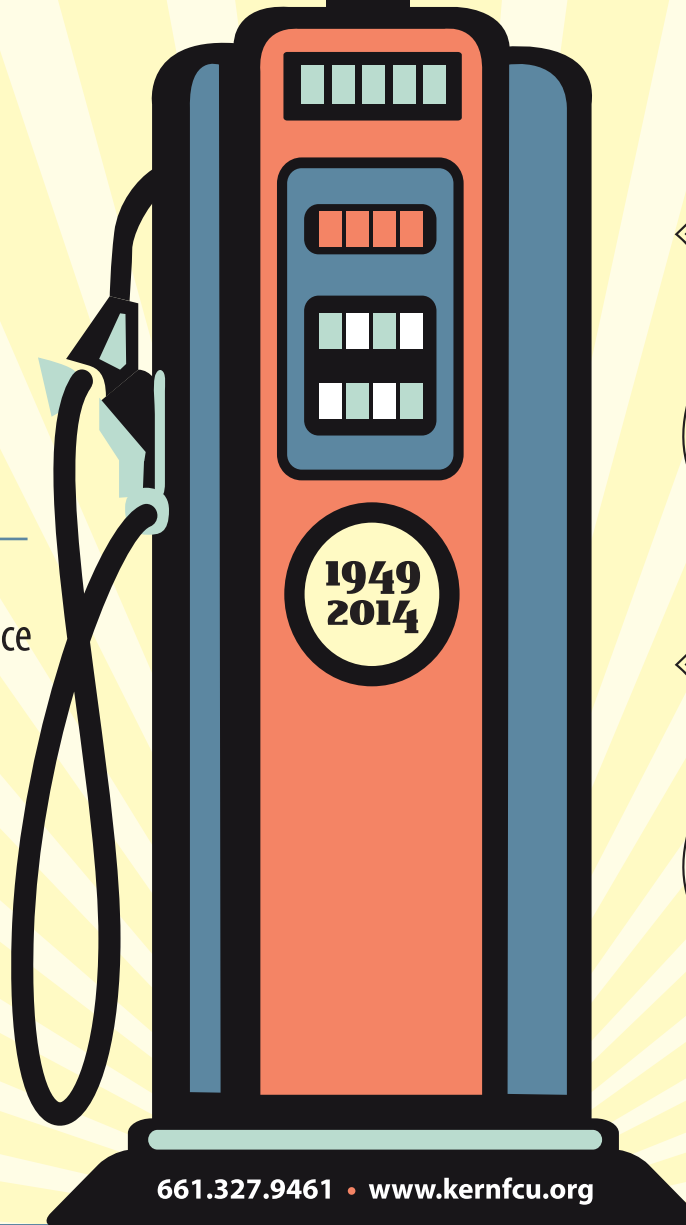
